Question: Greg Hoesly asked about extra money in the budget and why it couldn't be used for the parking lot at CTK

Answer: This money is for contingency reserve fund explained by Phil

Phil explained our budget for 2022

For 2022, pledges were really, really good but deficit budgeting of \$16,189 determined was a good idea.

Question: Brian Flynn asked if there was a plan for getting additional pledges for 2022 so we wouldn't have to operate with a deficit budget.

Answer: Benevolence would receive additional if giving ended up in a surplus – deficit comes from operating reserve.

Question: Deborah Nustad asked if high inflation built into this budget.

Answer: Education, property and tech budgets were all designed with inflation in mind.

Zoom question: How can we get more members to join.

Answer: Adrienne said giving was down due to members worshiping at home but options were made for those at home to give via the website.

Wayne Higgins asked about the back yard and it was tabled until the budget was talked about. Mary asked for motion to approve budget. Motion made & Seconded All yes & on zoom poll

Mary introduced Jackie Herington to discuss Servant Ministries. Requested 12% but 11.5% due to budget shortage so had to reduce. Despite reduction we were able to continue giving \$270,000. 11% for 2022. Question about \$40,000 synod benevolence

Backyard – Paul Karrels addressed what still needs to be done

New Business

Kevin Anderson discussed all the bids received (6 quotes good through 2022, material costs would not increase but that the biggest unknown was undercutting until uncovered.

Mary asked for motion on replacing parking lot. Motion made and seconded. Aprroved.




Pastors' Reflections John Horner-Ibler

Now all the Athenians and the foreigners living there would spend their time in nothing but telling or hearing something new. ~Acts 17:21

There is a hint of world-weary perceptiveness...and also humor...in Acts 17. The apostle Paul makes his way to Athens, the intellectual center of the Roman Empire, and finds religious and philosophical chaos. Every idea in the world is discussed there as people seek understanding and knowledge. And yet, no one seems to really be finding the meaning of life. Potential and resources are everywhere but insight into God and self had gone missing.

The educated, multi-cultural, growingly affluent world to which the book of Acts (the history book of the early church written by the evangelist Luke) was written reminds me of our own. Its circumstances were similar to ours as were the problems.





...as a whole, it seems like the collective "us" is making some bad choices. Sunday School and Confirmation are definitely secondary priorities to more families than ever. Sporadic attendance has the trickle down affect of making instructional and relational continuity impossible even for more regular attenders. A church like UNITY is able to offset some of that given the skills of our staff and volunteers but even the most resourced church can't overcome these trends forever.

If the alternate activities were as life-giving as what we offer I'd be okay with it, but I doubt they are. I say that not as a pastor, just as a slightly world-weary observer of human behavior. Whether it's sports, the arts, STEM, or anything else aimed at our adolescents, there's a sugar-buzz flavor to teen activities and family attempts at quality time. People are literally trying too hard to have it all be special; thinking that special will then also be enduring.

Special and enduring are rare. They come from deep within and also far beyond us. At its best, the life of faith approaches those traits far more often than anything else. But it takes time and vulnerability and modern life runs low on both.

With that as a backdrop, when I think back to 2022, here are a few challenges and a few blessings made real in UNITY's life last year.

Challenge. As noted, Sunday School and confirmation remain strong areas for our church and many things went well last year. Continuity is incredibly challenging though. We won't scold or shame, and I don't want this to feel that way to anyone reading it. I'm just saying, most of what we do is not as short term fun or exciting, but its long-term benefit is huge. In any field, selling the long-term feast when the short term snack is right there is tough. We need to help each other approach it in ways that sustain next generations.

Challenge. Staffing is harder and more expensive. This is an economic trend and a mixed bag. For too long, really essential people were badly underpaid in our economy and I'm glad to see that change. But it drives costs up and no one longs for that either. Again, it is what it is and as a church one of our secret weapons is volunteers. As we've faced shortages in our staff, volunteers have stepped in and their time has saved us thousands of dollars while keeping the place going. We owe them a huge thanks, while recognizing the long-term solution is still to fill the open positions.

Challenge. This one is longer-term but should be articulated. Your three pastors have been here 52 years between us. We won't stay forever. In my case, given my long tenure here I will try to give you a lot of lead-time. UNITY is strong and none of us irreplaceable. If it was just that, I'd have no worries. The challenge? Our larger church's call process doesn't work. Two comparable congregations to ours, Fox Point Lutheran and St. Matthew's In Wauwatosa have been in the call process over the past few years. Fox Point is very similar to UNITY in almost every respect and tried to call a third pastor. After 7 candidates, they gave up and went the route of hiring secular specialists in areas like youth and education. St. Matt's has been in the call process for a Lead Pastor for 2 years and has interviewed 13 candidates and still hasn't found a fit. The problem with the process is that in an age of information, congregations and candidates have virtually no way of knowing the other exists. And, our denomination still labors under a decades-obsolete idea that long gaps in pastoral leadership are somehow advantageous to a congregation. As a congregation, we need to get involved in pushing for a rapid and major overhaul of this system. Our long-term viability depends on it almost more than anything else we do right now.

Blessing. Don't let the above challenges deter or sadden you. Gospel means "good news" and whether in good times or hard, Jesus' good news is transformative.

So where did blessings abound for us in 2022? As you look at our financial reports, almost any appeal we were involved in last year came in above expectations. Our Council leadership is strong and is tracking long-term trends locally and in the larger church. Member involvement in our servant partnerships, music areas, education, and property will always differ from how they looked pre-COVID, but they seem to be emerging in a new and lively way. I actually don't want to single any one area out, lest it diminish the others, but this place is alive in Christ-centered ways and that's the point of it all, right?

Blessing. One illustration of the above might seem like a challenge, but it's not. Have you ever noticed that sometimes our visuals or audio aren't perfect in worship? Many churches our size and larger employ someone to run those things or have one or two volunteers who do it all the time. The result is fewer glitches. The result is also far lower member involvement. We run those things with several dozen volunteers, many of whom have that as the primary way they serve the church. Doing it less frequently does result in occasional mishaps. If in those moments we channel our support and patience to our many volunteers, it ends up blessing us all and that's how communities stay real and grow.

Blessing. Research done by the Pew Charitable Trust has found that while the largest growing faith category is "none," or "agnostic," what is also true is that the turn-over rate in those two categories is 4X that of any other category. In other words, people leave the church because it's boring or hurtful or anti-science, but they don't leave forever. Many who leave still long for community and the divine and a place to make a legit difference. They just haven't found the right place and they keep looking.pcu22057

Enter UNITY. Our aim has always been to embrace science as an expression of faith. We aren't shame and guilt-based. We may not be interesting at all times, but we can laugh and play with the best of them. We make love of neighbor and nurture of the future central to our priorities. We are what so many people are looking for. They will find us if EVERY ONE of us INVITES and WELCOMES from the depth of who we are.

And this gets me back to the beginning. Despite the idiosyncrasies of Athens, Paul engaged that city with humor and light. He offered them a Good News they didn't fully understand but which many received with joy. This is who we tried to be in 2022. A faith community that laughs and hopes is a blessing to jaded and stressed souls. Jesus helps us find the path forward and breaks the bread that causes our hearts to burn with life. There is plenty of purpose for UNITY in 2023 and not a day goes by that I don't look at this place and fall in love with it all over again. ~John

There is much that I give thanks for about 2022 and the moments that the people of UNITY helped make happen, but I'll share just three here. One was celebrating the 100th birthday of Pearl Haack and the 10th birthday of Joshua Graesser in worship at the CTK campus. In talking with Pearl, there is so much that has changed over the years, so much that she has had to experience and so much that she's been able to over the course of her 100 plus years. Even Joshua in his 10 plus years has already experienced more than what others across our synod have in what it's like for a church to come together as one with two campuses.

I have to imagine there will be more change over the next ninety years too. Maybe where a person's or a congregation's resistance to change sometimes rises up is when they perceive its change beyond their control or ability to be a part of shaping its outcome.

These last few years that have been marked by Covid, did cause me to worry about whether the church as we once knew it would ever come to be or if it would just accelerate the decline in involvement that so many congregations were already facing.

While we have no shortage of things we need to continue to work on, you supported this work through your strong giving and ways so many of you helped serve. This past year, we welcomed new members, had a record number of visitors at each campus and saw people flexible when it came to worship and having one preacher a weekend. We also saw more and more of you worship at the service time that worked best.

And I was reminded once again, that we are a part of Christ's church, which existed long before us and for sure, will exist long after us. The shape and the form may change as have denominations and church models, but Christ will continue to work through his people of every time and place to make known God's work through him.

Second moment, I give thanks for is what happened at the closing of Vacation Bible School this year. At the beginning of the week, kids are always a little hesitant to sing out and copy the motions made by the leaders up front. By the end of the week, the energy and life that fills the sanctuary is contagious! This year, during the closing time of singing, all the kids were up front on the altar singing their hearts out and doing the motions alongside those leading, who were once kids themselves a part of VBS and who understand deeply the power of what happens during this week. Memories made of fun, friendships, connections with youth and adult leaders, hearing Jesus' stories and learning more about and supporting our neighbors near and far. It brought tears to my eyes as a former kid myself who was welcomed into the church through the Vacation Bible School at Grace in Tomahawk. One of the songs was "Great things are going to happen here". Thanks be to God!

Third moment was All Saints Weekend, a poignant weekend of remembrance, grieving, thanksgiving and hope in what is yet to come for us because of Christ. Every year, as I look out and see the families for whom grief is so close, you can see it and my heart grieves for them and with them.

This year, my mom's name was added to the list as well as Pastor Mary Martha's mom, Kathy, along with the other members of Capitol Drive Lutheran Church, which had closed after being a church for almost 90 years in the neighborhood of 53rd Street and Capitol Drive.

Pastors' Reflections

I so appreciated your willingness to acknowledge all these saints and lift them up in thanksgiving to God. There was something so connectional in that they were being prayed for here and at Hephatha too as John and a group of UNITY members were in worship with them there. Just as the wooden cross sits on our altar table at the COL campus, and pictures of the members at Hephatha sit on the table outside the CTK, it's a living reminder to us of how we are connected as the body of Christ. To pray for, to remember, to work together with, to grieve with, to rejoice with, and most of all, to share in the work of the Gospel with and what Christ has done in us and through us! This is a part of who we are and our mission as Christ's church.

But for that to happen, then we also have to look to Hephatha and take a cue from their wisdom too. We have to be willing to share our fears, our hopes and dreams, our challenges, our struggles, our joys, instead of guarding them closely and trying to pretend we've got it all together, perfectly and completely. And, be willing to listen to those of our neighbor, with empathy and without judgment.

I fear this is what is leading people and our society to be out of balance especially after the devastating toll that covid had on so many and our world. It seems that some people today have more responsibilities and burdens to carry with much less support. If people can't share life and the ups and downs that come along with that road we walk with their church family, then it's almost impossible to receive any support or blessings in return by that faith community.

Whatever stage of life you are at, there are always things that can make it challenging, things you've never encountered before, going to school, starting a job, raising kids, caring for aging loved ones, dealing with conflict or messiness in relationships, dealing with loss, facing a health concern or diagnosis, struggling with questions that arise about faith or life and death that you don't quite have answers for, not to mention the impact of a world wide pandemic, and a thousand more.

But when we're able to bravely and honestly share where we're at with people we trust, we might discover others in a similar place or meet others who have already been there who can assure us we'll get through it too. And just maybe, we might encounter Christ who connects us and keeps leading us to be his Church together.

A place, NOT just about what God HAS done, but a space of what God has done AND CONTINUES to do AND WILL BRING to completion, wherever his people are gathered. May it be so for all of us in 2023 as it was in 2022!

Thanks be to God for all of you who are a part of Christ's church!


Each night our family reflection questions are:

- 1) something we are grateful for;
- 2) something we are troubled by;
- 3) something we are praying for.

They still seem like a solid combination of questions. The "grateful for" helps us savor the good stuff; the "troubled by" helps us be honest about the hard stuff; the "praying for" invites God into all of it. So each year I use those same prompts for the annual report. So here's this year's version: grateful fors, troubled bys, and praying fors for 2022 and as we head into 2023.

Grateful For: A HUGE energy surge of both people and money in 2022.

Giving went up. Worship attendance went up. Sunday school enrollment is back to pre-covid levels. Council teams reloaded. Huge new member class. New faces



Meanwhile, the digital ministries we discovered in pandemic only grew stronger! About 60 people worship online each week, about 70 listen to the sermon podcast, over 100 watch the Hump Day Hallelujahs, and the numbers only go up over time. The advent of Natalie into the communications role exploded our social media and devotional ministries to new heights. The energy is contagious! We feed off one another and watch with delight as God channels all that money and people power to change our lives and bless our neighbors.

Troubled By: A smaller staff and volunteer pool trying to do more with less.

This past year we did more programming than ever with fewer staff and volunteers than ever. The Sunday School teaching pool is only half what it was. Worship attendance increases outpaced worship volunteers. Two council positions remain vacant. We never filled the Adult Ed role after Pastor Josh left in 2020. We said goodbye to Graeme and Melanie at the end of 2021 but were without a media director until Natalie started in September and have yet to fill our admin and volunteer coordinator roles. Member Care retirement is imminent. Bookkeeper is postponing retirement to help out. Property management and CTK nursery are also open.

Filling these roles should be our top priority for 2023. We have been kept afloat by a truly incredible crew of volunteers who have stepped up to become pseudo-staff, piecing together by group effort temporary coverage for these roles. They are the heroes of the year! And we aren't far off from the rest. I keep praying, "Send us one more great staff member, just one more!" Brittany and Natalie have both already been answers to that prayer. Ten more once-a-month Sunday School teachers would cover every class. The fall Time and Talent push was a total God-send, and the Worship and Music team is working hard to train all the new worship volunteers who have stepped up recently. This is your church, and it is beautiful to see how you own it.

Praying For: Sustainable growth.

This growth is unheard of in church world right now. To have growing budgets, service, and kids.... UNITY is officially a unicorn. A treasure. UNITY, this is who you are: a faith community that is open, intelligent, kid-friendly and kid-full, not fear-based but grace-based, a shame-free zone, playful and purposeful, multigenerational, where people from opposite ends of the political spectrum work side by side to make an actual, long-term difference in people's lives. This combination is rare and precious. I see how you each invest your time, energy, and money with incredible generosity to the work of this place. It inspires me every day to give what I can, too.

As I write this I am just back from a 2-month sabbatical. I'll tell you more about it elsewhere but it was an experience I will treasure forever. So helpful, and so very fun! Sabbaticals also are rare... and I thank you and my colleagues for the precious gift of that time. Then, as I looked out at all of you, tears just started sliding down my face. Because for just a split second I saw you the way God sees you. Every life unique, so much beauty, so much pain, hopes and dreams and hurts and fears, simple faithfulness, little kindnesses, silly senses of humor... and all of you showing up to be part of something bigger than yourselves. I'll never forget it. I love you, UNITY, and I am heart-burstingly proud to be one of your pastors.

Worship Numbers

This will be the last year we do not report worship numbers. They stopped being relevant points of comparison when COVID began in 2020 and we only returned to full tracking of attendance number in the Fall of 2022. Our old baselines will continue to be there as a point of comparison. New ones now exist too. We have our online audience (full worship video, sermon video, children's message video and sermon podcast), we have one fewer weekend service, and we will be able to offer outdoor services in the pavilion on a consistent basis in summers to come.

We can say that the on-line audience remains robust. When we go out a month out from the date of a service, we'll have had 160+ views or listens to any given service.

For the first part of the year, our in-person attendance ran at about 50-60% of pre-covid levels. That was consistent with or even slightly above what most churches were reporting.

Late in the year, those numbers began to rise and our Christmas Eve numbers ran at about 75% of previous years.

Attendance patterns everywhere are in flux. In all things, maybe most of all the praise of God, we are better together. In-person worship remains a blessing to our common purpose and we pray for as many people to be here as often as possible. But, what COVID also clarified is that in-person worship is a risk point to some people's health and for them on-line worship is a God-send. A big part of that on-line audience is also people who live in other parts of the country and welcome a chance to worship with us from afar. Nothing is ever ideal but there are many benefits to our identity as a three campus ministry, CTK, COL and On-line.

We are now tracking all our in-person and on-line worship experiences and we'll see what those numbers look like in aggregate for 2023. You know the Council, pastors, and staff are always not just open to your input, but seeking it so that we can be a nimble congregation. Our quest is to honor past traditions while also constantly being the new thing Christ promises we can be. Help us to walk that line wisely and well.



FINANCE Adrienne Krueger, Treasurer & Phil Roemaat, Finance Chair



The Finance Team works closely with the UNITY Church Council to plan, monitor, and account for the financial affairs of the church. We work on the budget, oversee accounting and depositing of the offerings each week, conduct an audit of prior years' record keeping, and advise the Council on other financial matters as needed.

The Finance Team holds regular meetings with team members monitoring all areas including legal, banking, real estate, insurance, and audit. The current members of the team are Penny Berglund, Kevin Grabowski, Tim Herman, Greg



Schreiber, and our pastors. We thank them for their support and continuing to help UNITY with their own unique talents, knowledge, and experience. We're a fun, engaging group who really care about placing the church in the best possible position for both the church's short-term and long-term goals. If any member of the congregation has an interest in joining UNITY's Finance Team, please contact us; we would love to have you.

For 2021, UNITY went into the year with budgeted giving of \$1,125,301 and expenses to be \$1,141,491, which would have created a small deficit of \$16,190. Actual giving was \$1,172,926 and expenses were \$1,133,694, which resulted in a surplus of \$39,221. This was a positive trend after a tough 2021 year that was excellent to see.

Additionally, UNITY applied for the Employee Retention Credit (ERC) in the fall of 2022. The ERC is a payroll tax credit for retaining employees during the COVID-19 pandemic and having the pandemic adversely impact the church. We anticipate that UNITY will receive a refund in the Spring of 2023, and depending on the interest received, we believe UNITY will receive a check around \$140,000.

For 2023, UNITY budgeted for a 6% increase in giving compared to 2022. This was based on a strong appeal campaign and the hope that our giving trend continues to go up. Most expenses were similar to 2021; the largest change was in staff salaries & benefits. Additionally, there was a slight increase to the percentage going toward benevolence. With all these changes, we are projecting a break-even year for the church. This does not taken into account the ERC refund.

We give special thanks to Ann Hill and Craig Nelson for all that they do to keep our accounts in order and reconciled. Tracking the finances of a church with an annual budget of more than \$1,200,000 is a lot of record keeping. Last, we would like to thank all of YOU as a congregation for all your generous giving and commitments to all that we do.

Over the course of 2022, we decided to postpone the Spring New Member Class as attendance in worship and Sunday School "post Covid" was more sporadic, making

it harder to gauge who was interested in becoming a part of UNITY. With Lock-In attendance and VBS signups increasing in our Christian Education area late Spring and mid-June, we started to see a change among our families with kids and began seeing visitors in person with more frequency. By fall, we had people asking us when we were going to have New Member Classes! We welcomed 12 households, made up of people who had been worshiping for quite some time and many who had grown up here and now had moved back into the area wanting to be a part of UNITY again. We are very grateful to have them as part of our wonderful community.

Every year, our wider Church asks each congregation to submit information about such metrics like attendance numbers and ministry areas. This year, the questions include a focused attention on what kinds of measures a congregation has in place to welcome visitors and follow up with them. It can be hard to know who is a member, but if you look closely, it's not nearly as hard as you might think. Members often come in and either start talking with others or know what to do, where to sit, etc., Visitors might move a little more slowly, looking around and taking everything in as they try to familiarize themselves with what to expect. They may also have questions regarding how Sunday School works or where the bathrooms are. If you don't exactly know how to answer, go directly to one of the pastors or one of the staff and let them know.

You can also introduce yourself to them and invite them to fill out a Welcome card and place it in the offering plate. This allows us to follow up with a welcome email and share any information that they may have been interested in. We never want to make people feel like they are being pressured but we do want people to feel noticed and welcome. In addition, there are also people who come to UNITY via online worship and so, we'll continue to explore ways to reach out and engage them in our mission and community.

SERVANT MINISTRIES Jackie Herington



It is an honor and a privilege to share the compassionate and generous ways that UNITY extended healing and support to our local communities and beyond this year. Thank you for every act of generosity! Thank you to our devoted ministry advocates! Let's keep spreading love and healing and may God continue to bless us and our partners.

UNITY has 10 Servant Ministry partners, which include 2 inner City Milwaukee congregations, 2 El Salvadorian congregations, 2 addiction treatment centers, a homeless shelter, a free clinic, a food pantry, and a blood center!! Each partner has a dedicated UNITY advocate that works with the partner to create meaningful relationships with our congregation and walk together as the body of Christ to meet the needs of the people that the partner serves.

In 2022, 11% of UNITY giving (\$130k) was gifted in Benevolence to our Partners in addition to member directed gifts -Totalling \$225k given! The Servant Ministry Advocates work with their partners to project and finalize financial support amounts to assist with our partners operational needs to continue with the amazing work they offer! Please refer to the 2022 Benevolence Financial Report for giving details. Also, see below for some highlights of the needs that were met for our ministry partners through UNITY's generosity and support:

- <u>Aspen Recovery Center</u> received much appreciated cards of encouragement, a Thanksgiving meal, Christmas gifts, and funds to support recovery treatment throughout the year from UNITY members!
- <u>Blood Centers of SE WI</u> hosted two (2) blood drives and collected approximately 56 blood products with UNITY, enough units to save approximately 165 local patient lives!
- <u>Bread of Healing Clinic</u> thanks UNITY for many months of volunteering at vaccine clinics and participation in mobile delivery teams, fighting Covid and caring for un- or under-insured patients. Over 5,000 vaccines for almost 3,700 people were provided! End-of-year surplus went to fund a year of continuous glucose monitoring for three patients. And Angel Tree gift cards and benevolence funds gifted support the clinic in hiring RNs to work 4 days a week.
- <u>Cross Lutheran Church</u> UNITY members took time to volunteer with their Backyard Garden Project, collect and deliver bags for their Food Pantry, and participate in a dinner gathering for discussion to expand awareness and strengthen relationships with different experiences, perspectives, and needs.
 - The 2022 Lent Offerings were directed to support Cross' Worship Technology project. An amazing \$8,492 was raised for this project from UNITY!
- El Salvador UNITY members continued to support student scholarships in 2022.
 - o Fourteen (14) travelers braved COVID and its restrictions to return to visit Rutillio and Cordero connecting with our El Salvadoran partners for the Mission of Healing Trip in February. They traveled to four different locations, and provided basic medical care to 300 individuals.
 - Fourteen (14) travelers made the journey to El Salvador for our annual summer relationship-building trip to visit our partners in the Rutilio Grande community and at Cordero de Dios Lutheran Church in August.
 - o Thanksgiving Offering (Rutilio Grande Christmas Chickens Gift): \$3,363!!

- Hephatha Lutheran Church thanks to the generous UNITY members for so many gifts and deliveries:

 - o Numerous mittens, scarves, and various other donations made throughout the year
- <u>Hebron House</u> UNITY Benevolence gifts were used to help fund remodel projects which will enable them to serve more guests in greatly improved spaces! Meal deliveries will be provided every other month with the new Monthly Partner Meal Prep Nights at UNITY.
- <u>Serenity Inns</u> UNITY members, including many confirmation students, continue to step up and provide meals multiple times per month to both the SI residential house and SI Alumni house. Additionally, gifts were fulfilled by UNITY members to spread God's love to their residents this holiday.
- <u>Waukesha Food Pantry</u> UNITY volunteers regularly served at the Food Pantry throughout the year. The Summer and Fall Bag Sales collected record breaking totals of \$2,190 and \$3,380 respectively!

STEWARDSHIP TEAM

Leadership of this team was unfilled during the 2022 period. That did not stop UNITY from having a strong year in the primary areas that Stewardship guides.

It's always important to lift up Stewardship's role. The word itself implies that we are not owners of our material goods or even lives. They are gifts shared with us by God who gives us oversight, or stewardship, of those gifts. This is a very counter-cultural way to view ourselves in a very self-focused time and very different from how most cultures see "ownership" of material things.

A big part of the disconnect between "church" and the other parts of our lives comes from this distinction. There is something both freeing and humbling about seeing yourself as a steward rather than owner.

Perhaps a small thing for all of us to be working on is awareness of our role as stewards of time and gifts. There is less worry about control and more of a chance to collaborate when we approach life as a steward. Jesus' affirmation of those who multiply gifts as successful stewards should be pretty encouraging, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

With that in mind, the Stewardship Team exists to

- Encourage member involvement with time and ability in every aspect of our ministries
- Encourage member financial support of our core operating budget (which covers the cost of our staff, buildings, benevolence, and programs).
- Encourage member financial support of special financial appeals.



Thank you again to outgoing chair Mark Miller who led the pledge appeal for 2022. The emphasis of the appeal was to reverse a four year (2018-2021) pattern of 1-2% declines in giving. Our goal was to get back to 2018 levels of giving. We thought that might take two or more years to accomplish, but we almost did it in 2022 alone. Pledges and subsequent giving were up by 10% and got us within about \$30,000 of 2018 giving.

This past year's appeal was also strong with an estimate that pledges and ongoing electronic fund transfers (EFTs) will be up around 5-6% for 2023. This allows us to project moving past those record levels set in 2018.

We did not hit our goal of 300 pledges and ongoing EFTs and came in at 268. This is lower than last year's 297 but higher than any year since 2019.

We also had a very strong response to our push for people to fill out new Time and Talent surveys. Here too we have not hit our goal of 300 but we are into the mid-200's and this remains something you can do at any time. Go to the home page at our web site, click on the colorful stewardship tree image and then scroll to the bottom where you can click on the online version of the form. (If you are reading this in the on-line version, click here for the link.) We need help from lots of people as our ministries grow and grow. Thanks to hundreds and hundreds of you who already teach Sunday School, maintain property, make music in a choir, serve among our servanthood partners, sew, help with our youth group, and serve in so many other parts of UNITY.

Our special financial appeals finished strong in 2022. The Backyard appeal ultimately brought in \$40,000 more than was pledged and the Parking Lot appeal brought in \$15,000 more than was pledged. Our appeals for Lent, Thanksgiving, the Food Pantry of Waukesha County, and El Salvador scholarships were all the best or among the best appeals ever.

We give special thanks for the work of our Financial Secretary, Craig Nelson, who makes sure individual financial records are correctly entered, to our counting teams who make the weekly giving entries, to John Vaughan who served as our Bookkeeper for the first 9 months of 2022 and to Ann Hill who now fills that role.

You can see the importance of stewardship as a personal philosophy and group undertaking. Would you consider being on the Team? Or even chairing it? We have lots of momentum and lots to still accomplish. It's a good time to be needed and an even better time to be a steward.

On behalf of all the people who helped with the 2023 appeal and the 12 hours of on-line coverage we did for that appeal, thank you!

We have a lot of really great Senior High kids at UNITY from different schools and it's a pleasure to see them bond with each other on the trips and at the Sunday evening events. This is the verse I hear myself saying repeatedly as I reflect on the good news and great joy we experienced this past year. As educators we are taught to start with the end in mind to guide where we are going. So, for purposes of this reflection, I will start with where we ended 2022... The Good News and Great Joy we experienced during our beloved Christmas program and the joyful journey we traveled this year.

December was filled with joy and enthusiasm as we prepared for the birth of Jesus. During Advent Fest, 250 people joined together to eat, worship, sing and craft. For this year's Christmas program, 124 kids delighted us with their singing, music, and storytelling of our Savior's birth. Although we didn't get to fly an angel across the stage with a fishing line and pulley system as was requested by one of our angels, we can still dream big:)



And dream we did! This past spring and summer the buildings were energized with Sunday school lock-ins, First Communion, Vacation Bible School, and summer Sunday school. We were slowly coming together on the heels of the pandemic and little by little we were regaining our strength as a faith community. By Vacation Bible School, we had 110 kids, 45 crew leaders, and 38 site leaders and volunteers at CTK campus. During Summer, we saw an energized return to summer Sunday school with options to attend at COL and CTK. We realized that amid really busy family schedules, the new normal was a commitment to Sunday school and kids showing up at either campus depending on the time that worked best for that particular weekend. We saw this trend continue into our regular Sunday school year which is great for building a shared Sunday school community across campuses and "time zones". Such good news for our UNITY families.

As we headed into fall, 40 seventh and eighth graders returned for confirmation and we also nearly tripled our Sunday school registration from last year. We had 140 kids registered and more than 100 kids attended opening weekend! However, we also know we couldn't do this without the 31 adults who volunteer to help lead Sunday school. As we ran some pre and post covid registration numbers, we discovered that we are at about 90% pre-covid numbers of children attending Sunday school and about 50% pre-covid adult helpers. It is the love and commitment of our adult leaders that run our program so we will continue to pray for our Sunday school leaders to help teach our kids and for new leaders to realize when you try it, you leave totally energized. It's just how it works. You give. God fills you up. And most of all, our kids leave here and look forward to their next return. Thank you, adult leaders, for sharing the Good News with our UNITY kids.

This year, our children have filled the altar during Children's Message time and the classrooms and the hallways with pure laughter and joy. I am so grateful to Colleen King, our Education Chair, who led our Advent Fest this year and who has been so instrumental in all our event planning and Sunday school programming. I am also thankful for the unwavering support of our education team for their leadership, planning, and "all in" commitment to our program. Education remains true to its vision. We are committed to educating our children PreK- Confirmation and creating an inclusive environment where our children will grow in their faith, community, and connections. I am in awe of the commitment of our families and the dedication of our children to serve their church and their community through their music, their stories, and their desire for servanthood projects. Our collected offerings allowed us to give \$369 to the Waukesha Food Pantry and purchase TWO goats for Heifer International. Dollars and cents can make a difference:) As we look forward to 2023, I am committed to helping them achieve those goals and honoring the legacy of our outstanding program that continues to share GOOD NEWS and GREAT JOY.

Pastor Sherrie was preaching, and her sermon spoke to us in a way no sermon ever had before. We left that service knowing we had found the perfect church for our growing family and became members in March of 2020.

In the fall of 2021, our world was flipped upside down when I fractured my shoulder and needed a full shoulder replacement. UNITY stepped in immediately and provided support through meals, prayers, care packages, cards and check-ins all throughout my recovery. It was an incredible blessing and filled our hearts with gratitude during a very hard time. UNITY is more than just a church, UNITY is family.

Following my accident, I prayed a lot. I lost mobility of my right shoulder and continue to work every day to regain the strength and mobility I once had. I prayed that God would show me the way and promised to just let go and let God. I always thought I knew what I wanted in life but always felt something was missing. So, I handed it over to God, sat back, and waited, trusting that God would show me the way. Little did I know he would literally send Pastor Muriel to my doorstep with a job opportunity at UNITY.

Since starting this past fall, I have been working on a variety of media and communications, such as video shooting and editing, social media networking, email campaigns, podcasts and so much more. I am looking forward to further enhancing all the ways we communicate the amazing things taking place here through our ministries and hope to see our church family grow closer and more united through our acts of service to our communities, partners, and each other.

I loved UNITY before I started working here and since starting here my heart is overflowing with love and appreciation for this incredible community of people brought together by God to do God's work.





- To the Congregation, the Pastors and staff are a huge part of what makes UNITY. Also due to the budget last year, we were not able to give them the increase in salary we would have liked to. Therefore, the Pastors and Staff will be receiving a bonus.
- The remaining surplus will be placed in the Operating Reserve.

ERC- Employee Retention Credit

The ERC or Employee Retention credit is a refundable tax credit created as part of the CARES or Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act. There have been a few updates or changes to the ERC since it was first passed, mostly to the dates that it covers. However, one of the biggest changes was that businesses who accepted the PPP loans were now also eligible for the ERC. Originally, this was not the case. The finance committee decided to use a 3rd party company who specializes in filing the 941-x with the IRS for this credit. We decided to go with a local company called BeBetter. They filed our paperwork on 11/15/22. The IRS has estimated it can take up to 6 months to receive the credit. The amount that was filed for our refundable credit was \$142,230.34. Since this credit was from 2020 and 2021, we will also be eligible for interest once we receive the payment. Depending on when this is received the estimated interest ranges from 10k to 15k. BeBetter has a fee based on the amount that is received, this amount will be about \$21k. With these amounts UNITY is looking to net out of this credit in the range of 131k to 136k. The committee chairs were then asked to submit if they had a use for some of the funds. Below is a breakdown of the credits we filed for and the costs and what the council is recommending using the funds for (amounts are estimated based on totals with 1st Quarter interest).
